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Laws governing boards of health signed

Local boards of health and county public health partners will be interested to know that Governor Culver has signed the revisions of Iowa Code Chapter 137 into law. This chapter deals specifically with local boards of health. Changes include: no new city boards of health will be allowed to form after July 1, 2010; language about Public Health Modernization and the Iowa Public Health Standards has been added; the section on district boards of health has been expanded to contain the necessary legal foundation; and local boards of health will now have the ability to impose both criminal and civil penalties.

lowa Code Chapter 136, which relates to the roles and responsibilities of the Iowa State Board of Health, also received an update. Changes include: updating the membership to include both a physician and members with public health experience; updating the board's duties and the removal of outdated language; additional language to allow the board the ability to create a substance abuse and gambling program committee to oversee licensure of those two programs; and changes to allow the board more flexibility in scheduling their meetings, which must be held at least six times a year.

Iowa e-Health receives \$8.4 million

IDPH has been awarded \$8,375,000 over the next four years to plan and implement lowa's statewide health information exchange (HIE). The funding comes from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the National Coordinator for

Health Information Technology (ONC) as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

lowa e-Health is a public and private collaboration with a mission of improving health care quality, safety and efficiency through the use of health information technology (health IT). Health IT offers an opportunity to improve patient care through the collection of patient health information in electronic health records that can be shared with other care providers through the statewide health information exchange. This information is vital for professionals to provide effective care that can save lives. Regardless of whether you receive care across the street or across the state, medical professionals will have the ability to access your health information instantly through the secure statewide health information exchange. Governor signs domestic violence prevention bill

I am pleased that Governor Culver recently signed legislation that will help protect Iowa families by taking guns out of the hands of abusers. Senate File 2357 prohibits a person who has been convicted of a domestic abuse crime, or is subject to a permanent civil protective order, from possessing firearms or other offensive weapons.

Service contract quality improvement update

As mentioned in *Quick Reads* earlier this year, IDPH has committed to making some important quality improvements regarding our contracting process. Beginning as early as July 1, we will introduce an electronic file sharing system similar to the document library available to Health Alert Network (HAN) users. Called SharePoint, the program will not be as restrictive as that of the HAN and will utilize expanded features to allow easy access to folders and files.

I'm very excited about this development, as using an electronic file sharing system implies a real cost savings. For contractors, such as local public health agencies, the new system will decrease the time it takes for service contracts to arrive from IDPH, meaning that local partners can begin serving their communities in a more timely manner. They will also be able to submit expenditure reports electronically, which reduces turnaround time for payments. Additionally, contractors will no longer have to use registered mail or hand-deliver grant applications to our office in Des Moines. Finally, this new system means decreased administrative costs for the state as well. By being able to access, review, approve, and catalog documents with just a few clicks of a mouse, IDPH will be able to reduce the amount of staff time devoted to completing the contracting process.
