Iowa Youth Survey about to begin

The <u>2016 Iowa Youth Survey</u> (IYS) administration begins September 26 and runs through November 4. The survey is conducted by the IDPH <u>Division of Behavioral Health</u> in collaboration with the Iowa Department of Education, the Governor's Office on Drug Control Policy, the Iowa Department of Human Rights Criminal and Juvenile Justice Planning and Statistical Analysis Center, and the Iowa Department of Human Services. Iowa Store Mapper

Research has shown community health is significantly affected by the convenience stores and retailers in that community which sell tobacco products. The Iowa Store Mapper is a publicly available tool that displays tobacco retailer locations within the state. Data such as proximity of tobacco retailers to schools and parks, density of retailer in specific areas, such as low incomes, can be collected using the Mapper. With this knowledge, communities can collect valuable information to counteract industry influences, such as targeting youth as new tobacco consumers. The IDPH Division of Tobacco Use Prevention and Control has rolled this tool out to its community partnerships and looks forward to seeing how its data is used to develop policies to improve public health.


Healthiest State Walk

(MSA= Metropolitan Statistical Area. Each MSA must have one city with at least 50,000 inhabitants or a Census-defined urbanized area with a total metropolitan population of at least 100,000)

Each year Iowa families bring home a healthy baby with all the potential for a full and productive life; however, some families will suffer the loss of their child soon after birth. Risk factors for and causes of infant death include defects (inherited and congenital disorders); preterm birth (birth before 37 weeks gestation) and low birth weight; Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS); maternal complications of pregnancy; and injuries. Iowa's largest counties currently have the lowest rate of infant deaths.
