# Legislative Update

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#### **Opening Remarks...**

For folks who care about issues impacting older adults, the time to act is now! Your elected representatives are making public policy decisions on your behalf that will affect you. Are policy makers rebalancing Iowa's long-term care system and fostering innovation? You decide:

House File 825, formerly House Study Bill 284 (House Republican Health and Human Resources Appropriations) passed out of the full appropriations committee on Tuesday and will be moving to the House floor in the near future (probably next week). The amendments to HF 825 passed do not address the Department's concern regarding the Case Management Program for Frail Elders (CMPFE) and \$61,594 for the Department's nutrition program. The Governor's budget included \$500,000 to partially restore funding to the CMPFE program and \$61,594 for the Department's nutrition program that the House Republican FY 06 budget does not.

The Governor has proposed an increase to the tobacco tax, which would address the budgetary shortfalls within the Health and Human Resources budget. The House Republican's budget did not include any increases from the tobacco tax. Without an increase in state appropriations, increasing numbers of frail and vulnerable seniors may be at risk of being unable to access needed services.

The CMPFE program is the gateway to the Title XIX Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Elderly Wavier program, to the Senior Living program, and to the coordination of long-term care services for the most vulnerable seniors at risk of premature or unnecessary institutionalization.

DEA's Comment on the proposed FY 2006 House Republican Budget:

#### **STRENGTHS**

- As proposed in the Governor's budget, the House Republican budget includes a 1.0 FTE to DEA for policy issues associated with assisted living, adult day services and elder group homes. As the department currently receives no funding for this responsibility, this position will provide much needed relief.
- As proposed in the Governor's budget, the House Republican budget provides funding to DHS for a 3% increase for home and community based services (HCBS) and a variety of other long term care options. This is a positive first step in bumping up Medicaid remuneration with actual provider cost, and to provide incentives for HCBS providers to expand capacity and thus access to services as Iowa continues to rebalance its long term care system. Medicaid reimbursement rates for HCBS services have remained relatively unchanged for the past decade. We agree with Representative Mark Smith's comments in the appropriations standing committee that there will need to be continuing efforts to align Medicaid reimbursement rates with actual provider unit cost.

#### **CONCERNS**

Case Management Program for Frail Elders (CMPFE) (Please see this weeks program feature below for additional information on the history of the CMPFE Program and the impact of inflation). The Governor proposed a \$500,000 partial restoration of funding to the Case Management Program for the Frail Elderly, which the House Republican Budget did not include.

- This program has not had an inflationary increase since its inception in 1990. The increases that were provided were to allow the program to expand statewide. The program was expanded to all 99 of Iowa's counties in FY 1999.
- 2. From FY 2001 to FY 2005, the CMPFE program lost 46.37% of its state general fund appropriation. The Area Agencies on Aging have been forced to use direct service dollars (that could be used for critical services such as adult day services, home delivered meals, transportation, chore services, etc) to maintain the foundation of the CMPFE program. Local providers have had to subsidize this program by supporting ongoing case management, with Medicaid reimbursement rates that do not meet their actual unit cost and other un-reimbursed expenses. To that end, the foundation of the CMPFE program is rapidly eroding. The program did receive a partial restoration of \$500,000 to CMPFE through the Senior Living Trust in FY 2005.

#### CONCERNS (House Republican's Budget) continued

3. Waiting lists have begun in numerous parts of the state for admission to the CMPFE program due to lack of resources. This is problematic in that CMPFE is the gateway to the Title XIX HCBS Elderly Waiver and Senior Living Program dollars, both programs have been a successful Medicaid cost containment methodologies.

*Nutrition Programs*: The Governor proposed a \$61,594 increase to provide full funding for this position the House Republican budget did not.

- 1. The department's nutrition program has over 400 congregate meal sites.
- 2. The cost of these programs is \$9,352,906, with current oversight being provided by a .27 FTE.
- 3. Numerous studies link malnutrition and poor nutrition to a premature institutionalization and contributes significantly to multiple other chronic conditions.
- 4. Only one third of Older Iowans consume a diet rich in fruits and vegetables. Poor nutrition is an important modifiable risk factor for several chronic diseases, including cancers and cardiovascular disease. At least 20% of cancer incidences are preventable with appropriate diets.
- 5. The department's ability to leverage other dollars will be significantly impeded should resources be unavailable.

#### Office of Substitute Decision Making HF 120, SF 211:

The office of substitute decision making would act as a means of last resort on behalf of adults who do not have the cognitive ability to act on their own and do not have a family member or other designated adult to make decisions related to finances, health care, long-term care, etc...

Substitute Decision Making is not in the Governor's proposed FY 06 budget, but was a department offer and the legislation was part of the Governor's legislative agenda. Prior to the first funnel, the Department acted in good faith to move this program forward by seeking a federal grant through Title IV of the Older Americans Act, by agreeing to remove all controversial language pertaining to registration fees and reduced the number of FTE's from 3.0 to 1.5. To that end, House Democrats were willing to sign off on the bill. House Republicans objected to the need for increased state general funds appropriations in year two and the bill for all essential purposes died in the first funnel (HF 120).

This proposed legislation has the potential to offer a return on investment to Iowa's taxpayers through fees generated for representative payee services and for assisting Medicaid probate property under the Medicaid Estate Recovery

## **CONCERNS** (House Republican's Budget) *Office of Substitute Decision Making continued*

Program. Substitute decision making also expedites the process of moving adults unable to make their own decisions from restrictive and costly environments to more appropriate settings.

Senate Democrats have been receptive to the idea of amending the appropriations bill in the Senate to include language establishing the office of substitute decision making. If the appropriations bill should be amended in the Senate, it will likely still be an uphill battle in the House.

Iowa is one of six states without an office of substitute decision making, yet, per capita, is number two for the number of adults over 85 years of age and number three for persons 75 years of age and older.

In order to establish an Office of Substitute Decision Making, the Department of Elder Affairs must have an appropriation of \$135,548. These dollars would be used to match the \$391,642 grant dollars earmarked for the department under Title IV of the Older Americans Act. Without the state match of \$135,548, the department will give serious consideration to declining the federal grant.

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#### Day-By-Day at the Capitol

#### Monday:

The Governor signed <u>HF 281</u> related to inheritance taxes. The House passed <u>HF 760</u> (with an amendment clarifying resources), which is a scaled back version of the department's dependent adult abuse bill. <u>HF 617</u> related to Assisted Living Waivers passed the House and moves to the Senate. The House Appropriations Committee voted out <u>HF 709</u> related to Prescription Drug Assistance and <u>HF 736</u>, related to the Medicaid Asset Disregards. Both bills now move to the full House.

#### Tuesday:

A number of bills moved in the House on Tuesday morning related to older adults. The department's bills, <u>HF 585</u> (Assisted Living), <u>HF 587</u> (Adult Day Services), and <u>HF 710</u> (Elder Group Homes) all passed with amendments and with no votes against any of the bills. They all three now move to the Senate. <u>HF 786</u> related to easing regulation related to other businesses in Health Facilities also passed the House and now moves to the Senate. As discussed previously, <u>HF 825</u>, The Health and Human Resources budget bill passed out of the full appropriations standing committee.

#### Wednesday:

All committee meetings in the house were cancelled to allow for floor debate. The Senate Human Resources standing committee was also cancelled to allow the Senate to debate bills. HF 770 related to the food code passed the House and now moves to the Senate. HF 781 related to a Direct Care Task Force passed the House and now moves to the Senate. SF 355 Medicare Task Force passed the Senate and the bill moves to the House. Please note that there were a number of amendments adding members. The Department and representatives from each Area Agency on Aging are included in the bill. The Senate deferred on HF 786, related to "other" businesses in a health care facility. Please note that HF 736 related to the Medicaid Disregard is now HF 819 and that HF 709 related to Prescription Drug Assistance is now HF 821.

#### Thursday:


The House convened early for the Easter week-end as did the Senate.

#### Notes:

- Inflation Data obtained from InflationData.com
- Inflation impact is based on state general fund appropriations and not actual total cost to provide case management services.
- Senior Living Program dollars began in FY 01, therefore, SLP dollars were not adjusted for inflation.
- Based on standard inflationary data and actual FY 04 CMPFE participants, in order to maintain 1998 levels of funding, the appropriated dollars should be \$320 per participant per year vs. the \$210.00 appropriated in FY 04. (FY 05 data is not yet available).

#### **Conclusions:**

- Without including inflationary impact since 1998, the actual state appropriation (both SLP and State General Fund) to CMPFE has decreased by \$62.00 per participant per year or -23%.
- To keep funding levels at a 1998 level, considering inflation, the actual CMPFE appropriation should be \$320 per participant per year vs. \$210.00, a needed increase of \$110.00 or +34%.
- Based on 2004 actual figures, an additional \$1,381,820 is needed to remain at 1998 spending levels.
- The Governor's FY 2006 budget proposes a \$500,000 partial restoration to the CMPFE program. The House Republican budget proposes no increase.

- <u>SF 156</u> **Health Center Programs** A bill for an act relating to health care by providing for increased health care access, developing a lay health workers network, and providing appropriations. (Appropriations) Committee members: Hatch & Tinsman (C), Angelo, and Dvorsky
- <u>SF 157</u> **Older Iowans Legislature** A bill for an act making an appropriation for the older Iowans legislature. (Appropriations) Committee members: Angelo & Dvorsky
- SF 275 Farmer's Market Vendors A bill for an act requiring the department of agriculture and land stewardship to revise certain application requirements applicable to the women, infants, and children Iowa farmers market nutrition program and the senior farmers market nutrition program and providing an effective date. (Agriculture) Passed to the House
- <u>SF 314</u> **Medical Savings Accounts** A bill for an act relating to contributions made to medical savings accounts for state income tax purposes and including effective and retroactive applicability date provisions. (Ways and Means) Committee members: Connolly, McKibben, Miller, and Quirmbach

<u>SF 332</u> **Patient Advocates** A bill for an act providing for judicial branch employment and compensation of patient advocates for persons involuntarily hospitalized for mental illness. (Judiciary) **Passed out of committee** Floor manager: Tinsman

<u>SF 335</u> **Adult Abuse Cases** A bill for an act relating to access to dependent adult abuse information and unemployment compensation claims. (Business and Labor) **Passed to House** 

<u>SF 376</u> **Pension Exemption** A bill for an act providing an additional exclusion from pension or retirement income for certain taxpayers for purposes of the state and individual income tax and providing a retroactive applicability date. (Ways and Means)

<u>SF 379</u> **Probate Code** A bill for an act relating to the Iowa probate code, the Iowa trust code, and certain other trusts. **Passed Senate to House**
